The Sapphires team is ready to welcome in the month of March (and hopefully more Spring weather) with enthusiasm! This month we will be focusing on fun themes, such as Dr. Seuss' birthday, Spring and zoo animals as we prepare for our field trip to the Philadelphia Zoo in the middle of April (April 15, more info to follow)! Please remember to respond to your child's teacher about conference week, which is March 9-12<sup>th</sup>.

During Writing this month, we will continue to focus on using a capital letter at the beginning of our sentences as well as beginning with a story starter, such as: Today, Yesterday, My sister and I, etc. We are also practicing putting a period at the end of our sentence, as well as using spaces in between each word. As the number of word wall words on our word wall increases, we ask that you continue to practice these words at home, whether it be picking them out in library books, on signs or in their own writing.

In math we have begun chapter 7, which focuses on representing, counting and writing numbers 11-19 (otherwise known as the tricky teens). We will also continue to practice our newly found skills of addition and subtraction, as well as counting by 1's and 10's to 100, comparing numbers and numeral writing.

Please continue to practice shoe tying and coat zippering at home, as well. We also encourage you to dress your child in layers. With the weather still so unpredictable, we want them to be comfortable throughout the day, no matter what the temperature! Think Spring thoughts!!

#### Emerald's Team (Mrs. Doherty, Mrs. Lennox, Mrs. Madormo, & Ms. Hazard)

During our Orton-Gillingham phonics instruction, our students will continue to work on identifying letters and sounds, forming letters correctly, and blending sounds together to form a word. We also practice writing dictated words and sentences using the Orton-Gillingham approach. We are encouraging our students to take the skills learned during OG and *apply* them during our small group guided reading time. Guided reading provides the children with many opportunities to work on vocabulary words, phonological/phonemic awareness, comprehension, and decoding. The children are making nice progress!

In math, our students will continue practicing addition and subtraction. We will also learn how to represent, count, and write the teen numbers.

Please continue practicing self-help skills with your child at home, such as tying shoes and zippering jackets.

We look forward to the arrival of the spring season and hopefully some warm weather! Thanks for all you do to help support your child's learning.

#### From: School Nurses

#### Subject: Strep Throat

From time to time it becomes important to inform parents of certain infections arising in the school. Multiple cases of *strep throat* have been diagnosed in various classrooms. Group-A Streptococci are bacteria that can cause a variety of illnesses, the most common of which are strep throat, scarlet fever and impetigo. Please review the following information:

<u>Causes:</u> Strep throat is an infection caused by streptococcus bacteria; infection is more common in children than adults. Strep throat is easily spread when an infected person coughs or sneezes contaminated droplets into the air and another person inhales them. A person can also get infected from touching these secretions and then touching their mouth or nose. If not treated strep throat infections can lead to scarlet fever, rheumatic fever, skin and ear infections, and pneumonia. Children are most likely to pass strep to others when they have symptoms and until they have been on antibiotic treatment for 24 to 48 hours. Symptoms usually begin 1 to 3 days after exposure. Someone can be contagious for 10 to 21 days or longer if the disease is untreated.

#### Symptoms:

Strep Throat - may include

- sore throat
- fever
- headache
- stomachache
- tender, swollen glands in the neck

Scarlet Fever

- may have all symptoms of strep throat
- bright red, rough textured(sandpaper) rash begins on the trunk and spreads outward
- nausea/vomiting
- strawberry tongue

<u>Treatment:</u> Call your healthcare provider; the diagnosis of strep throat/scarlet fever is best made by a throat culture. Strep infections are treated with an oral antibiotic for 10 days. Occasionally a healthcare provider may give a single long-lasting injection. If left untreated or only partially treated (not taking all of prescribed medications), strep infection may occasionally lead to rheumatic fever or kidney disease.

<u>Prevention</u>: Wash hands frequently. Cough or sneeze into tissue. Dispose of tissue properly. The use of handkerchiefs is not recommended. Toys and surfaces should be washed and disinfected daily. Food and eating/drinking utensils should not be shared.

Please send and physical or dental forms to the nurse's office ASAP.
